## The Preparation of the Gifts

We last left our discussion of the Celebration of the Eucharist at the Offertory procession, the first point in the Liturgy of the Eucharist. I would like to continue from here by looking at a part that often gets overlooked unless you attend daily Mass and can focus more upon the actions/words that take place – the **Preparation of the Gifts**.

The altar is prepared for the Celebration of the Eucharist by the priest (or deacon if he is assisting) and the vessels/instruments of the sacrifice are placed, some of which include the **Sacramentary (or Roman Missal)**, which is the book (usually on a stand for easier reading) which contained all the prayers for the entire Liturgical Year and the rubrics for valid celebration of the Eucharist. **Priests are NOT ALLOWED to construct or addend any of the Eucharistic Prayers** – they are to be recited in their printed format for the licit and valid celebration of the sacrament. Another instrument used in the celebration of the Eucharist is the **corporal**. This cloth (usually embellished with a red cross in the center) is opened and placed upon the altar before the vessels are placed. Its practical purpose is to collect any particles of the sacred host or any drops of the Precious Blood that may fall upon the altar itself. Thirdly, the **purificator** is placed next to the chalice, and its purpose is to wipe the rim of the chalice after the water/wine is prepared and after the priest (and/or deacon) receives from the Chalice. The purificator is also used during the cleansing (or purification) of the vessels after the distribution of Holy Communion.

Once the altar is set, the priest comes to the center of the altar and elevates the **Paten** – the metal disk-like plate containing the large Host (and sometimes smaller hosts) for consecration and recites the following prayer – “Blessed are you Lord, God of all creation for through your goodness we have received this bread we offer you, fruit of the earth and work of human hands it will become for us the Bread of life”. When a hymn or organ music is played during the offertory these prayers are recited quietly at the altar by the priest. However when there is no music, they can be recited aloud, at which the people would respond Blessed be God forever. The **Chalice** is then prepared by the priest (or the deacon) while the following prayer is recited quietly “By the mystery of this water & wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled Himself to share in our humanity”. From this point the chalice is brought to the center of the altar and the priest again recites the following prayer (either aloud or quietly) – “Blessed are you Lord, God of all creation; for through your goodness we have received the wine we offer you, fruit of the vine and work of human hands it will become for us our spiritual drink”. Again, the people can respond (if recited aloud) - Blessed be God forever. A quick note about these prayers and the motions that go along with them – they are parallel to the **Berakah (Jewish blessing prayers at table)** which makes sense as the Passover Meal which Jesus shared with His disciples would become the Institution of the Eucharist. The function of the prayer is to acknowledge God as the source of all blessing, and to give thanks for the fruit of human hands and of the vine (where the text for the words come from). At this point, incense may be used to venerate the gifts, the altar, the crucifix, then the priest and finally the people. Incense is traditionally used in the Church to symbolize the prayers of the people rising up to God – in this instance it is also used to purify the space in which the sacrifice will take place.

The priest then bows before the center of the altar and recites the following prayer quietly: “With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by you O Lord and may our sacrifice in your sight be pleasing to you, O Lord our God”. Then the priest (usually assisted by altar servers) purifies his hands in the **Lavabo rite** (lavabo coming from the literal Latin translation “to wash” or “to purify”). During this rite the priest washes his fingers (the other instruments of the sacrifice) saying to himself the following prayer: “Lord, wash away my iniquities and cleanse me from my sins”. The priest then returns to the center of the altar and facing the congregation greets them in the following invitation: “Pray brethren (brothers & sisters) they my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father”. After which the congregation responds “May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of His name, for our good and the good of His holy Church”. The **Prayer over the Gifts** is then recited and sets the stage for the Eucharistic Prayer. The prayer over the gifts is usually themed towards the liturgical celebration of the day - after which the people respond Amen, and then we move to the Eucharistic dialogue and preface.

A final thought about this often overlooked section of our celebration of the Eucharist. As the priest elevates the gifts during the prayer of blessing, he evokes many figures from the Bible – in particular the High Priest Melchisadek, the first to be called priest in the Bible (Genesis 14:19-20; cf. The Mass pg. 145). The priest also stands at the altar as the priests of the Jerusalem Temple offered at the altar of sacrifice in Jesus’ time and preceding. They washed their hands, asking God to be cleansed of sins and (by God’s grace) made worthy to offer the sacrifice. As the instruction comes from St. Paul’s 1<sup>st</sup> Letter to Timothy “It is my wish, then, that in every place the men should pray, lifting up holy hands.” (1 Timothy 2:8). This is why a priest’s hands are anointed and consecrated at his ordination – they along with the vessels constitute the instruments of the Eucharistic sacrifice (The Mass, 146).

## **Family Cube – The Art of Loving in the Family**

**NEXT Saturday, January 20<sup>th</sup>**

**TIME: 9:30am – 12noon**  
**LOCATION: High School Cafeteria**

Conducted by the Focolare Group  
*Who are trying to live this life of love*

BACKGROUND: *Family Matters*”, hosted by the Focolare Movement, brought over 250 participants to Maynooth University for a family day on Saturday, 29th April 2017. A dynamic, interactive program of interviews, panel discussions, talks and personal stories highlighted the challenges and joys of living as a Christian family in Ireland today.

The program was centered on Chiara Lubich’s *The Art of Loving* and Pope Francis’ recent *The Joy of Love* writings with a brief presentation enriched by a cascade of experiences dealing with family relationships, facing illness and death, the challenges of bringing up children at different stages of their lives, issues like bullying and other issues which touched a chord with many.

A Sikh couple, Romi and Harvinder Singh, shared how they have been living the Art of Loving in their family too and despite the challenges of racism, they stated that “it has always helped us to make positive steps in our lives.”

Three interviews enriched the day:

Fr Tim Bartlett, Secretary General for WMOF 2018, spoke about growing up in Belfast during the Troubles and the importance of family in his own faith journey. “Our first faith lessons are learned within our families. The WFOM presents a great impetus for strengthening and re-assuring families in their journey of faith and love”, he said.

Lorna Gold, of Trocaire’s climate justice campaign, spoke about her forthcoming book *Roar – A Mother’s Awakening* in which she shares her experience of coming to terms with the troubled future now awaiting our children as a result of climate change.

Susan Gately, journalist and author of *God’s Surprises – New Movements in the Church* highlighted the inspiring, supportive role of different ecclesial movements in fostering healthy family life and healing difficult situations.

The culminating moment of the day was the launch of the Family Cube to facilitate the family together to go on this journey of love. The cube is based on the Art of loving and Pope Francis Amore Letizia and contains key phrases which provide a motto for the family to live each day.
